ADDITIONAL INFORMATION

The Department of Urban and Regional Planning was created in 1965 in response to the growing national demand for persons trained in planning, urban affairs, and policy analysis, and the rapid population and economic growth occurring within the Sunbelt. Florida has been one of the fastest growing states in the nation and is projected to be the third largest state in the U.S. This growth has raised important issues about land development, housing, transportation and infrastructure, environmental protection, health care, and other issues, and the state has adopted a comprehensive series of laws that mandate planning at all levels of government. This has put Florida in the forefront of the national planning movement and has provided the Department with a strong, exciting, and supportive environment within which to offer a professional program.

Florida State University's Department of Urban and Regional Planning is the first planning program in the nation to sign an agreement with the Peace Corps in which Florida State University students in urban and regional planning may serve in the Peace Corps and provide urban planning assistance to developing nations. Students wishing to apply for this program should apply to the Peace Corps and the Department of Urban and Regional Planning simultaneously. Master's International participants specialize in planning for developing areas, and take electives in another specialization area or departments (for example, demography, economics, foreign languages, etc.).

The Undergraduate Planning Program offers Minor, Certificate and Pre-graduate Programs.
