Remember that NO doctoral program is accredited by the PAB because such programs don't generally focus on professional practice. The CIP does, however, evaluate Ph.D. programs for accreditation; if a Canadian school gives a Ph.D. and it is accredited, the CIP icon will be shown under that degree. No programs in schools outside of North America are eligible for accreditation, but you may still find them interesting.

You can lay the groundwork for a successful job search long before you graduate. By attending local and state meetings of the American Planning Association (APA) or the Canadian Institute of Planners (CIP) you will meet professional planners involved in a variety of projects—and learn about current and future job openings. It's a great idea to join APA or CIP as a student because you get all the benefits of membership at a very low student fee. As an APA member you will receive regular correspondence and newsletters from your APA Chapter and Section; newsletters often contain job announcements (even before you are in the market you can see the kinds of jobs that do become available, the requirements, and the salary!) In addition, APA publishes **JobMart** which lists job vacancies across the US (and sometimes Canada); APA members can subscribe to **JobMart** for \$35 a year.
