Thesis or Final Product: No thesis or individual final product is required. All students must pass the Comprehensive Exam and the Capstone Practicum.

Core Courses: Regional Economics, Statistics, Planning Methods, GIS, Law, Land Use, Planning Theory, Policy Analysis and a Practicum.

Indicators of Academic Progress: Maintain a 3.0 GPA. Pass Comprehensive Exam prior to entering second year core courses.

FINANCIAL AID INFORMATION

Internship Opportunities: The program announces internship opportunities continuously via e-mail. Internships are available in a wide range of public agencies and private planning consulting firms, as well as with not-for-profit agencies. Internships are highly recommended, although not a degree requirement. All students seeking internships are able to find them. Most internships provide either a stipend or an hourly wage. Tuition and fees are not usually covered through internships. Students may receive credit for internships as well as receiving a stipend.

Dept. Awards and Grants: New students: Two \$1,000 awards annually. New and continuing students: Three \$1,000 awards annually. Continuing students: One \$1,000, and three \$500 awards annually.

Teaching and Research Assistantships: University-wide competitive fellowships (graduate fellowship, advanced opportunity program for minority and disadvantaged students, non-resident tuition remission) and departmental assistantships (Teaching & Project Assistantships). Additional project assistantships become available when faculty obtain grants and contracts.
