



## **PLANNING – COMPARATIVE URBAN PLANNING AND POLICY**

The School of Planning at the University of Waterloo invites applications for a tenure – track position for a specialist with a focus on comparative urban policy, urbanization and planning processes and practices with transference to and from the Canadian context. The ideal candidate will have expertise in developing countries, international comparison or concentration on the urban system of a specific country. The School is particularly interested in candidates who can contribute to the School's active international teaching and research agenda with a South East Asian focus.

The successful candidate will teach and advise in both the undergraduate and graduate programs including the supervision of doctoral research, and carry out an active research program in comparative urban planning and policy. Applicants should qualify for membership in the Canadian Institute of Planners and are expected to be doctoral graduates with degrees earned before September 2008. Candidates should have proven records of research or be able to demonstrate the potential for high quality research to advance towards tenure in the School. The position is open at the Assistant or Associate Professor level; full professorship is possible for exceptional candidates. The search committee will begin to review applications on March 1, 2008 and the appointment is expected to commence on August 1, 2008. Applications should consist of a letter of intent, curriculum vitae, copies of recent publications, a statement of teaching interests, and a statement of research achievements and objectives, together with the names and contact information of four referees.
