The school has 70 full-time teaching and research faculty with backgrounds in anthropology, economics, engineering, finance, history, political science and sociology; and nearly 40 professional staff. SPP maintains 11 research centers, and external research support averages more than \$8 million a year. The school's annual expenditures exceed \$20 million. In the most recent reported U.S. fiscal year (2007), the National Science Foundation reported that the school is ranked first in the country for receipt of research monies from all sources as well as first from federal sources. The School of Public Policy enrolls some 1,000 students. Students are recruited internationally; many already hold policy positions in national and international organizations.

The Dean is responsible for the academic standards, fiscal management and development of the school. The Dean works closely with faculty in setting the academic agenda of the school; oversees the school's resources; participates in university governance; and represents the school within the university and to the wider academic, business and policy communities.
