## **George Mason University Dean of the School of Public Policy**

The George Mason University School of Public Policy (SPP) is a nationally ranked program with a doctoral degree and five professional master's degrees in public policy, international commerce and policy, peacekeeping, transportation, and knowledge management. It is located at the university's Arlington, Virginia, campus--across the Potomac River from Washington, D.C.

The school has 70 full-time teaching and research faculty with backgrounds in anthropology, economics, engineering, finance, history, political science and sociology; and nearly 40 professional staff. SPP maintains 11 research centers, and

external research support averages more than \$8 million a year. The school's annual expenditures exceed \$20 million. In the most recent reported U.S. fiscal year (2007), the National Science Foundation reported that the school is ranked first in the country for receipt of research monies from all sources as well as first from federal sources. The School of Public Policy enrolls some 1,000 students. Students are recruited internationally; many already hold policy positions in national and international organizations.

The Dean is responsible for the academic standards, fiscal management and development of the school. The Dean works closely with faculty in setting the academic agenda of the school; oversees the school's resources; participates in university governance; and represents the school within the university and to the wider academic, business and policy communities. The Dean must be a recognized scholar with demonstrated ability to manage a complex, diverse and growing organization. International experience would also be desirable, as the school has working relationships with leading universities in Asia and Europe. Although George Mason University is part of the state university system of Virginia, much of the school's research budget, including most of the funding for its doctoral students, comes from outside sources including foundations and federally funded research grants. The Dean must be able to build on the existing foundation of outside funding

for the school. The Dean reports to the Provost of the university. The position will be open in the summer of 2010.
